What I learned

And, researching information takes the majority of a blogger's time when writing a new blog post because they can look at multiple sources and each source could be saying something different or contradicting each other. Sometimes, it will only take 20 to 30 minutes to write the actual blog post, but it took the blogger over 2 hours to do all the research for it to make sure that it is as accurate as possible. I think I can say that thorough research is very important.

I also learned that even though Microsoft word, WordPress and Grammarly are there to help a writer with spelling and minor grammatical issues, they do not like AP style so you can't fully rely on them unless you want major points counted off, which can be hard to do because some people really hate seeing those red and blue lines under their work.

As I said earlier, I realized that blogging is something that I enjoy a lot, and I hope that my future class and time permit me to continue to blog. I perhaps I won't quite keep up with the AP style formatting, but a lot of the writing techniques that we learned in class I would like to continue to use.
